The experience of remote working during the Covid-19 emergency has demonstrated that more work than we thought can be carried out remotely in ways that are productive, cost-effective and attractive to employers and their staff. Workers overwhelmingly value the flexibility that remote working can bring, while employers cite access to talent, improved productivity and cost savings as potential benefits. Enhanced remote working also has huge potential to boost our response to community challenges like the climate crisis, employment, and regional development.

This webinar will explore the future for remote working from the perspective of workers, employers, communities and the economy. Three expert speakers will explore issues like productivity, health and safety, work-life balance, and staying connected with colleagues. They'll also discuss how remote working could change our approach to the organisation of our work and working time - and there'll be plenty of scope to contribute and ask questions.
